

Attention Flamborough and Halton Residents:

The Ministry of Natural Resources has advised St. Marys Cement that they can now proceed to the 45-Day Notification and Consultation stage of their Aggregate Resource Act application. As per my previous updates I expected this to happen. St. Marys Cement are now required to hold a Public Meeting that will be advertised in the local media. Once announced the 45-day period for objections to be submitted will start.

I have been advised that the upstairs hall of the Carlisle Community Centre has been booked by St. Marys Cement on:

Wednesday, April 22nd, 2009

Our community's strong participation in attending this meeting in great numbers to state for the record all of the flaws within the application and why this license should be DENIED is required.

As previously advised, I have contacted Premier McGuinty requesting that this license be denied.

A sample letter providing details for the community's objections will be provided at the appropriate time. Also a Coucill Motion requesting denial of the application is forthcoming.

ADDITIONAL UPDATES

Permit to Take Water - The Ministry of the Environment have today advised St. Marys Cement that unless they agree to redo the pump tests that were undertaken last summer, the permit that was issued will be REVOKED. The MOE is giving St. Marys Cement until March 20 to decide, or the permit will be pulled.

Campbellville Truck Route - Campbellville Road, between Centre Road and Milborough Line will soon be posted with "NO TRUCK ROUTE" signs. Both communities have been working towards making the area as "quarry proof" as possible. This will send out a strong message. Your trucks are not welcome here.
